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In His Time

On that glorious day when I stand in Heaven before the majesty of the Almighty, there is only one question I'm going to ask: "Why, O Lord, in Your omnipotent wisdom, did You make everything that is bad for you taste so good?" You and I both know that God doesn't actually operate that way, but let's be honest, friends - the struggle is real. I can often relate to the Apostle Paul when he wrote in Romans 7:18, "For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out." We all struggle when it comes to doing the things we know we ought to do. As followers of Christ, we know that we should have enough commitment and discipline to do what it right and necessary even when it is neither easy nor convenient.

There is a huge difference between our struggles with sin and our struggles with selfdiscipline. While I don't want to gloss over the extremely important topic of breaking free from sin, I realize that many of us struggle just as much, if not more, with selfdiscipline. For example, we all desire to have deeper prayer lives, stronger faith, and a greater knowledge of God's Word, and we know what actions we should take to achieve these things, but too often we fail with our follow through. Why do you think we struggle in such ways? Personally, I believe it has a lot to do with our extreme dislike of something called delayed gratification.

We love when something is gratifying but our sinful nature tends to make us only think about instant gratification and to shun paying attention to delayed gratification. We'll eat that chocolate doughnut covered in sprinkles because it makes us happy now and avoid thinking about the long-term implications. We will walk right past that person who needs our prayers simply because it messes up our schedule or because we fear being rebuked. What does it matter that taking those five minutes to stop and pray might have sown the seed that later resulted in salvation? It's so easy to tell ourselves that we'll worry about the consequences tomorrow just so we can enjoy the momentary pleasure of doing what is easy today.

In case you've forgotten, Jesus warned against living this kind of life. In fact, the life and teachings of our Savior show us that God's plan for His children is one that includes embracing the practice of delayed gratification.

And he said to all, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. (Luke 9:23, ESV)

Learning to follow Christ is also about learning to say no to what is easy and convenient. This thought may turn a lot of people off from wanting to live a life for Jesus, but what we often overlook is the implied joy and gratification that will come from following the footsteps of our Savior. Even in simple things like trying to live a healthier lifestyle, our approach should be one that turns away from the instant gratification to await the gratification that God will bring in His time.

Reaching Kids for Christ By: Mark Phillips

I am sure by now you have heard the news that FBC Kids will be switching to the Awana program on Wednesday nights. This announcement has created a lot of excitement from kids and adults alike. This will bring significant change to Wednesday nights here at First Baptist, Farmington. I know there are, and have been, a lot of questions as to why the change is happening. The explanation boils down to kids. We want to reach more kids for Christ and this program helps us do that in a Biblical way.

Awana is a program that gets kids excited about learning the Bible. Each week, kids will be learning memory verses and working in their books to achieve goals through the Awana program. Awana can help kids learn about the Bible, memorize verses and make them lifelong learners in Biblical concepts. The kids will work at their own pace through the process because above all, we want them to learn and remember instead of just learning and forgetting. Kids will be working with adults every week who will track their progress and make connections with them that will last a lifetime. The Awana program allows for each church to customize the program based on

the needs of the church. This allows our church to keep music as part of our Awana program. Every two seconds someone in the United States needs blood for things like surgeries, chronic illnesses, cancer treatments, and traumatic injuries. A single car accident can require as many as 100 units of blood. Only 3% of the people in the U.S. donate blood, an one donation can potentially save three lives.

Join with First Baptist Church on September 21 from 2-7 p.m. and donate blood. There is an increased need for donations at this time, because with COVID-19 increasing in the U.S., it is

more important to maintain an adequate blood supply.

To make an appointment call 1-800-RED-CROSS or use the blood donor app at RedCrossBlood.org. You will need to bring a donor card or driver's license, be 17 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds, and be in generally good health.

The donation takes about an hour. Donors can also save up to 15 minutes by completing a RapidPass online. This will enable them to finish the reading and health history and should be done on the day of the drive at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass.

At a time when we may feel that we don't have control over what's going on in our lives, donating blood is an easy and safe thing to do for the benefit of others. If you are unable to donate, give this information to someone who can.

The Red Cross currently requires all donors to wear a mask during the donation process and will use a thermometer to check each donor for fever before being allowed to enter the drive.
