This past May my Mom lost her battle with cancer, but won the victory of her heavenly home in Christ Jesus. Christmas was always her favorite time of the year and she would go overboard for us kids and especially for her grandkids. She worked at Wal-Mart and shopped for Christmas all year in anticipation of the joy and excitement she would get as we opened the gifts together in December. This year will be our first Christmas without her and I know there will be moments of grief and pain.

For many of you this year has, also, been a year of loss whether from illness, divorce, conflict, or death; the pain and hurt is real. The prospects of celebrating Christmas has a different vibe and there is an uncertainty and perhaps a twinge of fear of what to expect as you participate in this year's Christmas celebrations. This morning I am reminded of the story of a young lady named Cassie.

"Under the weight of uncertainty and fear, I showed up to the candlelight service. Families were there to celebrate; it was Christmas after all. I found my usual spot at the front and as the first carols rang out, my tears began to fall. I felt like an imposter. I was a cloud of grief and darkness amidst a cheerful celebration. I felt guilty for dampening the time of rejoicing.

As I sat I found myself talking to Jesus. "I'm ruining your party," I told him.

It was his response in that moment that changed Christmas for me forever. He told me, Cassie, I came to that manger as a baby not for those in celebration, but for those in mourning. I came for you. In this moment. Right here.

For the first time in my relatively easy life, I was tasting heartache (and oh if only I knew how much more would come). And it was there that Jesus showed me the heart of Christmas. Jesus stepped down to pursue the broken and the hurting and the lost.

If this year has broken you down. Isolated you. Left you grieving or fearful or hurt. I want you to know that you don't have to muster up cheer. You don't have to feel like a downer in the midst of celebration. You can sit at the feet of a savior who came for you where you're at right now. That's how Immanuel works. It's God with us in everything giving us hope in the face of despair."

So I want to encourage you to join in on the celebrations, mourn for the losses and weep if needed. Allow God to reveal Himself to you in a fresh, new and vibrant way this Christmas even in the midst of your sorrow.

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What Does Advent Mean To You?

The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word adventus which means "coming." Our Advent season is supposed to be the time when we remember and celebrate the coming of the Christ-child and also to look forward to His second-coming. However, I've noticed that this season has taken on other meanings to some people, and that's not necessarily a good thing.

For some, the Advent season has become a time of materialism and cheap emotionalism. This happens when people focus on the "Hallmark" moments and over-stress the importance of brightly wrapped Christmas presents. I'm not saying it's wrong to enjoy your favorite Christmas movies and songs or that you shouldn't be getting gifts for those you love, but if you look to those things to give you joy, real joy, you'll be quite disappointed when January comes around.

For others, Advent can be a time of great loneliness and pain. If you're blessed with being able to spend the holiday season with friends and loved ones, you might be prone to forget that this time of year can especially tough for those struggling with grief or for individuals who don't have the opportunity to gather with others. This sad truth should remind us to reach out to those in need, to open our homes and holiday gatherings, and to point those who are hurting to the hope that is found in Jesus.

Worst of all, I've seen some look upon advent as the enemy. I'm referring to those who are seeking to remove Christ from Christmas, and I'm not just talking about when stores change their signs from "Merry Christmas" to "Happy Holidays." This is a problem that begins right in the heart of sinful man. When a person rejects the truth and continues in opposition to God, he or she will do just about anything to keep from bending the knee in humble repentance, and what this leads to is a total removal of anything that points to the one true light. So what can we do about this? The answer comes from us understanding what advent truly means and then by vibrantly living out our faith in front of others. I don't need to endlessly argue with those who seek to destroy Christmas. I need to live in such a way that they can see what the coming of Christ has done in my life.
