In 1970 we began sending \$100 a month to Eastmont Church, Wenatchee, Washington and continued this for 3 years. Mel Lantz resigned in February.

July 1971 brought John W. Jackson as Minister of Music and Youth.

The plans of McCall-Watson Architects were approved in 1971 for the new sanctuary. Our loan of \$250,000 was increased to \$350,000.

February, 1972 the contract for the new building was let.

Windows for the new sanctuary were from Hopcraft Art Glass Windows; cost-\$16,000. Pews were from L. L. Sams & Co.; cost-\$12,065 (including choir chairs). The sidewalks, front and sides of new sanctuary cost \$2,058.

In August of 1972, payments began to Ozarks Federal S & L for the new building

In June of 1973, loan was increased \$25,000 to \$375,000. Also in June, the price for a new Allen organ was \$12,500. Purchased a Ballwin Piano (6'2")

A new time was set for morning worship services: 8:45 and 10:00

In August, we paid the architect a balance of \$1,000; Brockmiller - \$7,000; Marler-\$3,000.

A sign was purchased for the front lawn measuring 60×40 . We bought 20 cots for Bates Creek Camp; 50 gold chairs for lounge @ \$17.93 each. Our insurance package (from Hulsey) was \$2,645 annually.

Dottie Lawson resigned as organist and Marie Stanfield resigned as treasurer of church. In December, Nora Merseal resigned as secretary; continued to substitute.

January, 1974, Mary Neely was hired as secretary at \$4,800, plus social security and retirement. During that year, 60 new choir robes were ordered. Total membership was 1466; Sunday School enrollment was 1116 with average attendance of 413. In 1974 special offerings for Lottie Moon - \$5,368; for Annie Armstrong - \$905. 25.5% given to the Cooperative Program and 2.5% to Associational Missions.

A musical Celebrate Life was presented on December 20 and 24.

In April of 1975, there was a dedication of the Essie Y. Newman Memorial Library in our church.

May, 500 new baptist hymnals were purchased at a cost of \$3.25 each.

June, two indoor bathrooms were installed at Bates Creek Cabin, as well as a septic tank. Total cost - \$800.

In July, a recommendation was brought before the church to give Bro. Jolly the parsonage at the time of his retirement. Vote was by secret ballot: (95-yes/34-no)

Resident members in 1975 were 1026, non-resident members were 464. 1141 were enrolled in Sunday School with average attendance of 436. Value of church property is listed at \$900,000; Lottie Moon offering \$5,575; Annie Armstrong offering \$1,084.

In 1976, Lodean Dugal agreed to serve as Vacation Bible School Director, Mrs. Jolly having served for many years prior.

A Thank You note was received from Delassus Church for the organ we gave them. The Bus Committee set up a fund for the purpose of obtaining another bus.

November, 1976, Brother J. Loren Jolly presented his resignation as pastor, to be effective December 31, 1976. November 28th is to be designated as "Jolly Day".

In December, a request for wages for a nursery helper at \$2.00 per hour.

The McGee property was purchased and Deed received. A new motor was installed in furnace.

In January, 1977, the McGee property sold as it stood for \$23,500.

In February, Rev. Jerry Cowin was called as pastor. The new pastor package: \$24,660, 2 weeks vacation, 2 revivals, 2 conventions.

April - bought property on Franklin Street between College and Spring St. from Marcus Savage (north half of Lot 1 & 2, Murphy Addition for \$11,000 from Chester Kollmeyer, south half for \$15,000 from John Lenz, south half of Lot 3, \$3,000. Total for three pieces - \$29,000. \$29,000 loan from Ozarks Federal S & L at 8%.

In May, we had a recognition service for E. R. McWilliams who had served as head usher for many years and was retiring.

A Love Offering was given in June for the Retirement Housing of Ernest & Betty Towler, who is retiring as Associational Director.

In July, the pastor's housing allowance was raised to \$4,800.

February of 1978, a new loan from First State Bank for \$7,600 to cover the roof of the old education building. Loan was at $8\frac{1}{2}\%$.

In March, conservation of energy was stressed.

June - houses on Franklin Street are to be torn down.

July - Voted to change to Bible Book Series in Sunday School.

August - Voted to use the money in 'debt retirement' and 'building fund' for necessary repairs.

September, 19% of money in building and debt retirement to be used to employ Minister of Education.

A new job description for custodian was set out.

January, 1979 \$1000 was used to repair old building. In June, the church offices were remodeled at a cost of \$6,000.

In June, Larry Johnson was called as Minister of Education. Total package \$18,342.

In April, the church voted to do a new Church Pictoral Directory by Christopher Reetz.

November, 1979, Marilyn Watts was employed as Pastor's Secretary.

December - church purchased a new snow blower. (\$825)

We were blessed with two summer missionaries: Paul Lindsay and Earl Peterson.

A call was extended to Wm. E. Willard as Minister of Education. Upon prayer and reflection, Mr. Willard declined.

Some remodeling work is being planned for the church offices.

Exerpts from the Annual Church Letter: Total membership - 1661; Sunday School average attendance - 405; Church Training - 90; Total to Missions - \$76,305.

The Missouri Baptist evangelistic effort "Good News Missouri" supported by our church. First Baptist pledged to give \$1 per resident member for promotion expenses for G.N.M. The Stallneckers, a family evangelistic team, were called to lead in a revival next spring.



It Began in 1882...


First organized as a mission of the Three Rivers (Union) Baptist Church, the First Baptist Church of Farmington came into being on March 18, 1882. Rev. James G. Hardy, one of the organizing elders of the church, served as the first pastor of the new church. Meeting first in the Christian Church, then in the Methodist Churches, and finally in the Farmington Baptist College Chapel, the mission moved around for its first eleven years, building to 57 members by 1888.

A small white frame church building was dedicated in 1893 on the site of what is now called the 'old sanctuary.' The next ten years brought the church membership to 144 and the Sunday School enrollment to 126.

A new brick church was built on the same site in 1910. Rev. O. H. L. Cunningham was pastor when the church was dedicated in 1917, and the membership had grown to 326.

Other major pastorates in the life of the church were those of Rev. F. Q. Crockett 1931-39, who now resides in Covington, Tennessee, and Rev. W. P. Young of Humble, Texas, who served until 1943.


By 1943 when Rev. R. Ray Stone came to the pastorate, the church had grown and had reached 534 with 360 enrolled in Sunday School. it was during his pastorate that the First Educational Building was



completed in 1949.

The present pastor, Rev. J. Loren Jolly, came in 1954 to serve a church grown to 905 members with 919 in Sunday School. The membership soon felt a need for an additional educational building, which was dedicated in 1962.

Two morning services had been necessary since the beginning of Rev. Jolly's tenure at Farmington, and since the membership had grown to 1465 the church voted to build a new sanctuary. That desire is culminated today as we dedicate this new sanctuary (after 91 years of serving Christ in Farmington.)

Church Celebrates 90 Years

By Building Program

The First Baptist Church of Farmington is celebrating its 90th anniversary this year by building a new church auditorium. The present construction is the fourth major building program since the congregation occupied the first e church at the corner of W. ge and Franklin Street after organization in 1882.

The new First Baptist Church Auditorium will seat 900 people, 732 of those in the sanctuary with balcony. This auditorium along with other improvements in

connection with the new building will cost well above \$400,000.

The new church building is a modern design "A-frame" construction building. The building will parallel West College Street and extend the Baptist Church's building complex to A Street. There will be only one step-up into the new church which will consist of the main auditorium, a balcony and a large lounge room with a seating capacity of 100. This room will be used for things such as wedding receptions, mid-week services

and as Sunday School classrooms for elderly church members.

The Reverend J. Loren Jolly is pastor of the First Baptist Church of Farmington and has served the membership since Apri of 1954. Rev. Jolly speaks of the church building programs as a means of serving the people. He stresses that buildings do not reach the people and emphasized that the "Whole purpose is to reach people for Christ."

Rev. Jolly gave as an example of how little effect buildings have upon attendance by referring to

the year 1961 and the building of the present educational building. At that time, he said, Sunday School was being held in five houses as well as the church buildings. Therefore it is not the buildings which bring people but that the people first come as members and build the buildings to fit needs.

The first building program at Farmington was in 1911 when the present brick auditorium for 350 people was erected on the corner of W. College and Franklin and replaced the original frame

hurch building there.

A second building effort was onstructed in 1948 of the first ducational building. That was a ree story brick structure along ollege west of the church uilding. Construction costs were nuch less then with the 50 by 100 oot building costing only about 85,000. Such a building would ost much more today.

The third and most recent uilding program was in 1961

when a new educational building was erected. Although only two stories tall, the new and presently used educational building was the largest yet in the church building complex. Costs for construction, furnishings and air conditioning were about \$225,000, said Rev. Jolly.

Finally, the new church auditorium is being built at a cost of between \$400,000 and \$500,000. include will some

remodeling of the old auditorium which is to be retained as a fellowship building.

Reverend Jolly is looking forward to completion of the new church because it will permit holding only one worship service Sunday mornings. Upon coming to Farmington nineteen years ago, Rev. Jolly initiated two Sunday morning worship services just to accomodate the number of people which were overflowing the 350 seat church. There have been both an 8:30 and 11 a.m. worship service each Sunday during his years as pastor.

The Rev. Jolly said there are more than 1100 resident members but a total of 1400 members carried on the church rolls. Some families move away and just never bother to transfer their membership. However, since

Baptists from other areas move here and also fair to transfer as members, the number of people served is about the same as those on membership rolls.

Average Sunday School attendance at Farmington First Baptist Church is about fifty percent of the membership, said Rev. Jolly. One year the church averaged an attendance of 548 for a complete year.

An interesting feature of the new church will be its faceted glass windows with panes bearing inscriptions and symbols. One window facing North A Street will be forty-eight feet tall. The four side windows on the south side will tell the story of the Old Testament and the four side windows on the north side will tell the story of the New Testament in symbols. The church will be dedicated sometime in 1973.








714 turn out for 1st looks at new church

Seven hundred and fourteen members and friends of Farmington's First Baptist Church turned out Sunday morning for the first service and cornerstone laying ceremonies at the church's magnificent new edifice.

Filled to overflowing, the \$5000,000 building seated the largest Baptist Audience in a single service here and still overflowed nearly 50 people into the aisles and lobby.

A 48-voice choir, under the direction of Music Minister John Jackson, was featured under the beautiful lighting of

Immediately following the service the congregation filed outside to line the sidewalks for the cornerstone laying

ceremony.

Presiding were Charles Schwidde, chairman of the Board of Elders, and Leo Dugal, chairman of the fund raising committee for the new church. Bill Pratt was in charge of the setting of the cornerstone.

Behind the cornerstone was set a large green file box that was kept unsealed until the last moment, in order to place inside the list of signatures of all who attended services Sunday.

The box also contained a long list of pertinent items.



This is part of a letter to Jollys from Mrs. R. Ray Stone (Harriet) written February 6, 1975.

Platte City, MO

"I have served on Finance Committee here this year - a <u>first</u> for me. The Finance Committee chairman had asked me to take about five minutes in service last Sunday to emphasize the budget and Cooperative Program because he knew I was concerned. I'm sending you a copy of my message because Farmington Church gave me the best example I know for Cooperative Program.

"God honors a church that shares with the world. years ago, my husband was called to be a pastor in Southeast Missouri. Our budget was \$6,000. They gave the pastor onethird of it. It was a county seat town of 3700, with 10 churches. The Baptist Church averaged 170 in Sunday School. They called us "Old 170" in the Association. We had a small sanctuary with a basement. One hundred seventy crowded into it. We began reaching out and teaching God's plan for giving. Offerings increased slowly. The treasurer said he had never been challenged to give before; he started tithing. When we launched plans for an educational building, he said he was for the building, if it did not cut down on our Mission gifts. The church agreed to add more each year to the Cooperative Program and as long as we were there it was increased by \$600 a year while paying for the education building. We were there ten years; the last year's Sunday School enrollment had grown to 995. The budget was \$49,990, and Missions totalled \$12,550 - more than twice the pastor's salary. The Foundation was laid for a great Missioinary Church.

Last Sunday it was my happy privilege to worship in their beautiful new sanctuary dedicated in 1973. They had adopted

a budget of \$153,000 with \$45,000 for Missions. Two girls from that church are on the Foreign Mission field."

Rev. R. Ray Stone was pastor here from 1943-1953. Mrs. Stone is a member of Platte City Church and Rev. Mel Lantz is her pastor.

Rev. J. Loren Jolly, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Farmington, may hold some sort of a record for longevity.

He's been a minister since 1942 and had only two churches -- eight years at the Hanley Road Baptist Church in St. Louis and a full 19 years in Farmington.

Rev. Jolly grew up on a farm near Pocahontas, Ark. He graduated from William Jewell College in 1938 with a degree in history and from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1942 with a Th. M degree.

During his seminary training he did have a third church for a time -- Riverview Church near Louisville, Ky. but it was while he was a student.

In 1943 he became a Chaplain in the Army and served for two years in Europe -- one year in combat in France and Germany with the

63rd infantry Division. He left behind him a bride of five years for he had married Miss Celeste Fowler, a girlfriend of 8 years standing, on Dec. 25, daughter, Paula, was born in 1947. She's a teacher now and Mrs. Paula Reynolds of Hillsboro.

Rev. Jolly's first official church, after returning home from service, was at the Hanley Road church. He remained there for eight years before accepting the call to Farmington in 1954.

It was a "homecoming" of sorts for Mrs. Jolly, whose grandfather, Rev. O. H. L. Cunningham, had been pastor of the church here between 1914 and 1920 or so and she had heard her mother talk about Farmington often.

The years have not gone quietly for the Jollys. There have been the duties of attending to a flock of some 1400 members and 19 years of preaching two sermons every Sunday morning.

But the two sermon Sundays will soon come to an end with the erection of the new 700-seat church at Franklin and College.

"It has been like having two separate congregations," Mrs. Jolly says. "Some of

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





MORE OF **OLD FRANKLIN**

The second annual meeting of the Old Franklin Association was held at Potosi in 1833. The number of churches had grown from 10 to 13, and the membership had increased from 374 to 544. Among the messengers was John Hutchings, who had been a member of the Convention in 1820 that formed the constitution of Missouri.

At the time of the formation of Franklin Association, there was strong anti-mission sentiment in Southeast Missouri. Franklin, however, was decidedly missionary. In its constitution, article 2 instructed churches desiring membership in the association that they would "not oppose those who wish to be engaged in the benevolent enter-prises of the day. ." Much progress had been made in Franklin Association even before the organization of the Missouri Baptist Convention, then called Missouri Baptist General Association, in 1834. By its 1835 meeting with Providence

Church, Franklin boasted 22 churches with a membership of 697. In 1837, the association in meeting recommended to the churches that they form Bible classes, forerunner of the Sunday School. Education and missions thus became, early in its history, the primary aim of Franklin Association.

Of the ten charter members of Franklin Association, only Union (Three Rivers) remains a member now, as the others have either disbanded or joined another association. It might be noted here that Liberty Church at Belgrade, was organized in 1816, prior to the organization of Franklin Association, but was then a member of Old Bethel Association. As anti-mission sentiment developed in Old Bethel, Liberty asked for admittance to Franklin and was granted membership, making it the oldest church in the Association.

Editor's Note:

We hope you have been enjoying the monthly historical write-ups which have appeared in the OB-SERVER since October, 1975. There's more to come! As an bicentennial observance, our Historical Committee Chairman, Mrs. Jackie Huffman of Ironton has gone to a great deal of work, given much time in research and preparation, to give us some bit of our Associational History in each months edition of our associational paper in this year of 1976. We are most appreciative of Mrs. Huffman's efforts and valuable contribution.

THE DEATH OF FARMINGTON COLLEGE

Finances did not improve at the college, and at the 1896 meeting of Franklin Association, a financial agent was appointed by the Trustees to issue shares of stock for the purpose of paying the debt. Evidently the effort was unsuccessful, and by 1897, the debt was near \$5,000. Professor Jennings then offered to pay one year's interest on the indebtedness if the trustees would raise the money to relieve the debt. The association then instructed the trustees to accept the proposition, borrow the money by 9 P.M. and pay the debt, executing a new Deed of Trust as security for the loan payment. A committee was then appointed to raise the money to pay the loan, and the Trustees censured with a threat to sell the property if the debt was not paid within the year.

"A warm discussion" followed the report to the association in 1898. Professor Jennings had resigned at the college, and Prof. Jno. C. Turnbaugh had succeeded him. Enrollment was down, there was uncertainty about the association continuing to control the school, and there was still a \$5,000 debt.

In the next four years there was a succession of presidents and of failure to pay the debts. By 1902 the debt had increased to \$6,000. In the 1903 minutes of Franklin Association, the record states that the college property was sold August 7, 1903, for the purpose of establishing a sanitarium. Ten thousand dollars was received for the property, with which the debt was paid, and of the remaining \$3,681, most was loaned to Doe Run Lead Company at 6%, less \$175 paid to Mrs. Hollis by order of the board.

The Farmington Sanitarium still existed in 1904, when it had treated 125 patients. Thereafter, it is no longer mentioned in the minutes of the Association.



Rev. Jolly to conclude 22 years as pastor here

Rev. J. Loren Jolly, who has pastored Farmington's First Baptist Church for 22 years, tendered his resignation to the church board Wednesday evening.

Rev. Jolly will leave the pulpit here on December 31.

In a statement to the church members, Rev. Jolly said: "It is a decision reached many months ago, and the conviction that it is the will of God for me has not diminished. I am not retiring from the ministry but from the pastorate. My love and appreciation of this church has grown through the years. You have been good to me and my family. You have been kind, thoughtful, understanding, supportive, cooperative and generous toward us. We thank you for almost 23 years of service together."

Rev. Jolly was raised on a

farm near Pocahontas, Ark. He graduated from William Jewell in 1938 and won his second degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1942.

Rev. Jolly spent several years in the service as a Chaplain and served in Europe for two years during World War II.

He married Miss Celeste Fowler, a nurse, and they have two children, Jim – now a stockbroker in St. Louis, and a daughter, Paula Reynolds, a

teacher in Hillsboro.

His years of tenure in the First Baptist Church in Farmington were appropriate to his family. His grandfather, the Rev. O.H.L. Cunningham, served the same church as minister from 1914 to 1920.

Rev. Jolly said that he does not plan to retire from the ministry, only from the pastorate. Rev. Jolly, 62, has suffered from an eye ailment that does not allow him to read as much as he thinks necessary. He will consider taking a smaller church or serving as an interim pastor.

Rev. and Mrs. Jolly will continue to live at their present home, the parsonage that was given to them by the church about a year ago.

"I may have to learn to fish," laughs Rev. Jolly, who in a more serious moment admits that golf is his game and he expects to get in a little more of it next summer.

Under Rev. Jolly's guidance the church here has grown steadily and has had two major building projects, the educational wing in 1962 and the new sanctuary that was cornerstoned in 1973.

No successor has been named at First Baptist. A church committee is interviewing and traveling nearly everyweekend to hear ministers in other towns. They hope to make some recommendation to the congregation the next few weeks.



TWO PASTORS CONCLUDE MORE THAN 20 YEAR PASTORATES



Rev. V.E. Defreece leaves the Esther Baptist Church with a resident membership of 454 with an average Sunday School attendance of 145. There have been notable advancements in the improvement of church property, particularly with the building of a beautiful four bedroom, two bath parsonage. Total additions to the church membership in these almost 22 years of Bro. Defreeces ministry is 734 with 401 of them by Baptism. A wonderment to the pastor and people has been the increase in stewardship with a total income of \$29,147 reported in 1955 and 84,500 in 1976. Bro. Defreece leaves the Esther Baptist Church debt free.

In 1968 the Esther Baptist Church initiated a ministry that is the 'only one of it's kind' among our Baptist Churches. A Child Day Care Center, which today cares for approximately 30 pre-school children five days a week. Mrs. Defreece has been an important part of this work since it's inception.

September of this year marked 44 years in the ministry for Bro. Defreece. Coming to this area in 1955 were letters of commendation from Arkansas where he had served on the Executive Board with special emphasis in his work in the field of Evangelism. This fervor for Souls has not in any way diminshed down through these almost 22 years.

Nov. 28 was designated as "Loren and Celeste Jolly Day" at First Baptist Church Farmington. The Esther Baptist Church Cont'd on page 4 On Wednesday, Nov. 10th., Rev. J. Loren Jolly officially tendered his resignation as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Farmington effective Dec. 31. On Wednesday, Oct. 6th., Rev. V.E. Defreece announced plans for his retirement as pastor of the Esther Baptist Church effective Jan. 1, 1977.

As these retirement announcements come so close together there are parallels in the life and ministry of these two men.

Each has served his respective church for at least twenty-two years! Brother Jolly has been with Farmington since April 19, 1954 and Brother Defreece became Esther's pastor in Feb. of 1955.

Both men and their wives are natives of Arkansas. Bro. Defreece came to this area from Bald Knob. Bro. Jolly was pastor of Hanley Road Baptist Church in St. Louis.

Both men have given long and prayerful consideration to this new step in their lives and both will be living in Farmington. Loren and Celeste Jolly will continue to live at 312 W. College, the parsonage given to them by the church. V.E. and Sylvia Defreece have bought a lovely house at 411 W. Liberty, in which they are already living in. Both men have been very active in service to and through our Association. Bro. Jolly served as Moderator in 1961-1962 and was our very effective Sunday School Director several

Loren Jolly through these 221/2 years of most fruitful ministry.

TWO MISSIONS

Jan. 25, 1953, the Delassus Baptist Mission began with workers and leaders from the Farmington First Baptist Church. April 3, 1954 the ground-breaking ceremony was held with the dedication of the new building on Nov. 20, 1954. On July 29, 1956, the Mission became Delassus Baptist Church and the church celebrated it's 25th Anniversary in July, 1981.



LETTER FROM YOUR PASTOR




TO THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, FARMINGTON:




